Tookany Flood Study

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE) has nearly completed the Tookany Creek Flood Damage Reduction Study begun in 2012. Its preliminary analysis favors nine dry detention basins – six in Cheltenham Township and three in Abington Township – as the most cost-effective option to reduce flood damage in Cheltenham.

The study analyzed five alternatives, some with multiple configurations, as well as no action at all, and the ACOE calculated the cost-benefit ratio for each. Although the nine-basin plan was the costliest at about \$6,481,000, it also netted the highest annual benefit to the Township.

Dry Detention Basins

Dry detention basins are low-lying, open-space areas that would hold back the peak flow of rushing rain water during heavy storm events. They would slow the release of stormwater into streams to minimize downstream flooding. The basins would require minimal excavation and construction to store excess stormwater.

That not only reduces costs but also helps minimize environmental impacts.

Instead of large-scale excavation, an earthen embankment would be constructed on the downstream end of the detention basin to capture and control water flows. The embankment would include interlocked gabion baskets and earthen material that would allow flows at non-damaging levels to pass. If the stormwater inflow rate increases above that level, water flowing through the gabion basket structure would be “choked,” so a pool would form in the basin behind the embankment. If the ponding water exceeded the basin’s storage capacity, the embankment could be safely overtopped without failing. After the downstream levels normalize, the water in the basin would be slowly released through the gabion-basket conduit and everything would return back to normal.

The proposed basin locations, which are subject to revision during a detailed design phase, are:

- Doe Lane
- West Waverly Road
- Church Road (Arcadia University)
- Limekiln Pike
- Grove Park
- Highland West (Abington)
- Highland East (Abington)
- Baeder Road (Abington)
- Washington Lane
(lower level of Curtis Arboretum)

The ACOE anticipates completing an agency technical review of the study over the summer. The public release of the draft report should occur in late summer/early fall, which will include a public meeting as well as posting the draft report at www.CheltenhamTownship.org. After the feasibility report is finalized, project design is expected to take another year to complete. The earliest construction would begin in 2017.

Bickley Road Buyouts

The Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency approved the purchase of four homes on Bickley Road in Glenside under the federal Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. After enduring damage from Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee in 2011, the property owners applied to participate in the program and met the required criteria. With the federal grant funds, the Township purchased the properties this summer and will demolish the homes this fall. After regrading, the sites will be seeded and maintained as permanent open space.

From the Commissioner's Desk

Dear Neighbor,

My name is Morton J. Simon, Jr., but everybody knows me as Mickey. I have been the Commissioner representing Ward 6 for close to 14 years, so I'd like to focus on what's going on in the 6th Ward before describing some of what's happening in the rest of the Township.

Ward 6

Ward 6 is primarily the section known as Elkins Park, a large area east of Old York Road. Its main business centers are on the east side of Old York Road and around the Elkins Park Train Station. I have lived most of my life in the 6th Ward and think it is a far better place today than it has ever been.

Let's take a closer look at the "Elkins Park East" commercial district. First and foremost is the new market called CreekSide Co-op, which is owned by almost 2,000 local families but is open to the public. It sells a wide range of high quality organic, natural and conventional grocery, meat, produce, bakery and deli products, as well as prepared foods. Far more than a grocery store, it is a center of communal activities and offers indoor and outdoor dining. The area also boasts a number of retail stores, including a coffee shop, two jewelry stores, a bookstore, a frame shop and an acting studio, and features three excellent new restaurants within one block.

Another major player is High School Park, an 11-acre sanctuary where the old Cheltenham High School once stood. The park is a true collaboration between the Friends of High School Park and the Township. I'd like to extend my compliments to the Friends, who enjoyed their very successful 20th Annual Arts in the Park festival last June.

The Township has repaved and restriped the Elkins Park East area, while continuing to seek grant funding for major streetscape and traffic calming improvements. Residents plant flowers around the Elkins Park Train Station, which has recently emerged as "Elkins Central," a public gathering venue and satellite location for the Cheltenham Center for the Arts under a sublease from SEPTA through the Township. In addition, nearby Elkins Park Gardens Apartments was recently renovated and upgraded.

While admittedly biased, I think Elkins Park is vital to the heart and soul of the Township, and I encourage everyone to enjoy and support all this vibrant neighborhood has to offer.

Around the Township

I hope everyone will also support the beautifully renovated Easton Road corridor where the updated streetscape creates an attractive shopping environment on the west end of the Township. Check out the new Roberts Block restaurant near the Glenside Train Station and the newly renovated retail development called Wyncote Commons at Glenside Avenue and Rices Mill Road. Arcadia University is growing not only in size but also in international reputation, which is bringing much favorable attention to Cheltenham.

On the east end, the Ashbourne Country Club development will soon be proceeding, which will preserve 33 acres of open space for all residents.

We are also excited about the renovations planned for Cheltenham Mall and anticipate outstanding performance by Lindy Properties, a company with deep roots in Cheltenham, which recently acquired The Towers at Wyncote. Construction of the new Wawa on Route 309 should start soon. Finally, Einstein Medical Center Elkins Park on Township Line Road, originally purchased as the home for MossRehab – one of the outstanding rehabilitation facilities in the country – is now also a full service, acute care hospital.

The Future

So much is happening now, but I'd like to make a few predictions about the bright future I see for the Township. We will be completing rehabilitation of the sanitary sewer and have already been approved for additional sewer connections (see page 5). Flood control projects will be coming along (see page 1). The Ashbourne Country Club development will be successful, and homes will continue to sell at Wyngate. More Cheltenham residents will run Internet businesses and fewer will work in Philadelphia, so their taxes will stay in Cheltenham. Tax rates will go up as the value of our commercial areas increase, thanks in part to a \$1 million grant we secured for traffic calming improvements around Old York and Church Roads. Another \$1.6 million application is pending for other streetscape enhancements, and PennDOT recently repaved all of Old York Road. The Township continually seeks grants for community improvements, and I am hopeful that we will get funding for the streetscape around Elkins Park East. Pedestrian trails will continue to expand, with grants and plans already in place for the portion from New Second Street to Harrison Avenue.

Our parks, swimming pools, community centers, playgrounds and libraries are constantly being improved. Our all-volunteer fire companies continue to refine long-range plans to maintain great fire service. They are part of what I like to call the public-public partnership that thrives in Cheltenham. By "public-public" I mean the many citizens who work with the Township to advance the common good. It amazes me how much time and effort these "public" volunteers, such as the Auxiliary Police, Fire and Library Boards, Historical Commission, Economic Development Task Force, Environmental Advisory Council, Human Relations Commission, Planning Commission, Shade Tree Advisory Commission, Boards of Historical and Architectural Review, Twinning Committee, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Committee, numerous "Friends" groups and others, devote for the benefit of us all. I thank them all on behalf of myself and the entire Board of Commissioners. They help make Cheltenham great.

And one final reminder: Please spend your money in Cheltenham. We are doing everything we can to expand our commercial tax base, but none of it will succeed if we do not support our new and existing restaurants and other businesses. So let's choose Cheltenham, let's use Cheltenham, and let's make positive news about Cheltenham, as we all work together for a greater future.

Sanitary Sewer Update

This fall the Township plans to begin the biggest project to date in our sewer rehabilitation plan: replacing 3.75 miles of Interceptor A – a main sewer line – between Old York Road and Central Avenue. It will involve extensive excavation, some temporary construction easements, roadway closures and creek crossings for pipes, as well as restoration of all the areas disturbed by the project. The project design and technical specifications are complete. The Township expects to bid the project early this fall, start work by late fall and complete it by early 2017.

Backstory

Did you know that the Township's sanitary sewer system has about 106 miles of underground pipes and that some sections are nearly 100 years old? It transports sewage to Philadelphia's Northeast Wastewater Treatment Plant not only from Cheltenham but also most of Jenkintown and about one-third of Abington Township.

Maintaining the sewer system is a big job. Since 1997, the Township has used underground cameras to clean pipes and identify and fix small cracks. Larger repairs were also completed as needed. In addition, Township-wide property inspections ensured that sump pumps and downspouts do not illegally empty into the sanitary sewer.

However, five years ago, a rapid thaw of 10" of snowfall combined with heavy spring rains created high groundwater pressure that forced clean water into cracks in the sewer pipes and overloaded the sewer system, triggering sewage discharges. That incident spurred the installation of the temporary sewer bypass system: the four-mile long, 24" black pipe – with pumps and associated equipment – that runs primarily along the Tookany Creek from the back of Wall Park to a parking lot near Central Avenue. Until permanent sewer rehabilitation efforts are completed, the bypass prevents the main sewer line from again being overwhelmed during wet weather events by automatically pumping any excess flow that might occur from the Wall Park vicinity to a point in the main sewer line that is larger and can handle the excess.

The incident also spurred the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to sharply limit new connections to the sanitary sewer system in all three communities until permanent improvements were implemented. Those improvements have been a top priority ever since.

Act 537 Plan

In 2010 the Township began a comprehensive, detailed evaluation of the sanitary sewer system, called an Act 537 Sewage Facilities Plan, to address current and future needs. Completed in 2013, it identified four upgrades to be implemented in phases and detailed the responsibilities and cost sharing among all communities involved. A new inter-municipality agreement followed.

Phase 1A and 1B, relining approximately 11,000 feet of Interceptor A between Rices Mill and Old York Roads, was completed in late 2013. Due to its location, relining the sewer pipe, rather than replacing it, was preferable to minimize disturbance to the system and the environment. In 2013 the Board of Commissioners also adopted an ordinance to regulate fats, oils and grease (FOG), targeting main producers such as restaurants, delis, schools and private clubs with commercial kitchens. FOG poses a significant threat to the sanitary sewer system by potentially creating blockages in sewer pipes.

Although the sewer bypass system must remain in operation until all sewer rehabilitation projects are completed, clear progress has been made. Meters installed in the relined section of Interceptor A to measure flows showed a reduction in inflow and infiltration. As a result, this summer DEP released 383 EDUs (Equivalent Dwelling Units - a measure of sewer capacity per single residential unit) for Cheltenham and 200.5 for Abington and Jenkintown combined, to allow new connections to the sewer system.

Ready Montco



In July Montgomery County updated its system for sending emergency alerts to residents via call, text and email from ReadyNotify to ReadyMontco. To continue receiving alerts and to gain access to the new system's improved features, subscribers had to update their existing account or open a new one.

The improved ReadyMontco system offers several new options:

- Selecting as many or few alerts as desired for emergencies, weather, traffic and more.
- Receiving alerts via cell phone, email, text, home landline, work phone or new Mobile Member app.
- Selecting alerts for a specific address and other sites of interest.
- Specifying particular times during the day when a subscriber would prefer to block weather notifications.

Some of the notifications topics available include:

- Severe weather warnings, including tornado watches/warnings.
- Traffic disruptions, such as major collisions and road closures.
- Shelter-in-place and evacuation information.
- Significant water main breaks.
- Significant law enforcement or fire/rescue incidents impacting the community.

When an incident or emergency occurs, authorized senders will notify subscribers through ReadyMontco. This gives subscribers a direct connection to updates and instructions on where to go, what to do, what not to do, whom to contact and other important information. Cheltenham Emergency Management Drill

The Cheltenham Township Emergency Management Agency oversees training for Township public safety personnel and other staff to prepare for emergency situations we hope will never happen. The training ranges from online courses to table-top scenarios to full-scale drills.

Another full-scale drill with Cheltenham Township Police, Fire, EMS and Public Works Departments in conjunction with the Cheltenham School District is scheduled for October 24. Emergency responders and support staff – who do not know the specifics of the scenario – will arrive on scene with their vehicles and perform as they would in an actual emergency. Drills enable personnel to practice the techniques of the National Incident Management System, a standardized approach to incident management developed by the Department of Homeland Security, and identify and correct any gaps or problems.

Zoning Code Meetings

Look for announcements this fall about public meetings to review the latest draft of the Township's Zoning Code update. This draft is the result of eight years of work by two dedicated committees along with public input from presentations last year. Park in Driveway for Plowing

In preparation for the next winter season, the Public Works Department urges residents to park in their driveway **WHENEVER POSSIBLE** during snow events. To create the safest traveling conditions, plows try to clear snow curb to curb from roadways but cannot when vehicles are parked on the street.

However, parked vehicles **MUST** be removed from Snow Emergency Routes whenever two or more inches of snowfall are predicted or a Snow Emergency is declared.

Winter Rain Barrels

Rain barrels provide two great benefits: lowering water bills and reducing stormwater runoff. But they aren't designed for winter use. When cold weather approaches, disconnect your drained barrel for storage in a shed or garage. Or if you prefer to leave it in place over the winter, remember to drain the barrel before it freezes and attach the overflow line to the bottom drain to allow excess water to pass through. Be sure the hose discharges away from foot and vehicle traffic areas to avoid creating icy hazards.

Fall Leaf Collection

The Township's 2015 Fall Leaf Collection Program will begin on Monday, October 19 in Route 15. The 15 designated routes are identified by the accompanying map.

The program begins in mid-October to allow enough time for five collections – two for loose leaves and three for bagged leaves – in every route before winter weather arrives. Please follow the accompanying schedules and guidelines for the most efficient program.

Early in the program, collection crews may proceed to some routes ahead of schedule but will return to the route scheduled for collection that day each morning. Of course, inclement weather may delay the program; an early winter freeze can interrupt collections since leaf vacuums cannot pick up leaves frozen to the ground. To receive emails about any schedule delays, sign up for E-Notifications at www.CheltenhamTownship.org, which will also feature the information. Schedule updates will also be posted on www.facebook.com/CheltenhamTownship, Comcast Channel 42 and Verizon Channel 1960.

After the regular program is completed, the Township will consider additional loose-leaf collections for the first few routes in the schedule, depending upon weather conditions and leaf volume. Announcements about any special third collections will be posted with signs in the affected routes and all of the venues previously listed.

Free Drop Off Option


Instead of waiting for scheduled collections, residents may drop off biodegradable paper bags containing leaves, twigs, grass clippings or garden debris at the Waverly Road Compost Facility throughout the year. Located on Waverly Road between Church Road and Cheltenham Avenue in Laverock, the facility is open weekdays from 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., unless affected by a holiday. No drop-offs are permitted when the facility is closed.

Landscapers Note: Landscapers must obtain a Township permit annually to drop off leaves and other garden debris at the Waverly Road Compost Facility. The cost is \$50 for landscapers that pay the Township's business privilege tax and \$100 for others. Additional charges apply per cubic yard of debris.

Loose Leaves Guidelines

- Rake leaves to the curb **no more than 14 days prior** to the scheduled collection day, in accordance with Township Ordinance. Violators are subject to fines.
- Rake only leaves; do not include twigs or branches, which may jam the leaf machines.
- **Do not put leaves into the street immediately after a collection. Violators are subject to fines.**

Bagged Leaves Guidelines

- Use biodegradable paper bags **only**. The Township sells bags at the Township Administration Building, libraries and community centers.
- Put bagged leaves at the curb just prior to their scheduled collection day.
- Do not put trash, large branches, dirt, stones or rocks into the biodegradable paper bags. However, grass clippings, twigs and garden debris may always be included with leaves.

Additional Guidelines

- Never discard leaves, grass, twigs, branches or garden debris with regular trash.
- Have landscapers cooperate with the collection schedules.
- Do not park over leaves since heat from a vehicle may ignite a fire.
- Never burn leaves or place leaves at the curb anytime after the final collection, as stipulated by Township Ordinances.
- No branch collections will be scheduled during the Fall Leaf Collection Program.





Proxy Registration Policy

Someone other than a parent – a proxy – will be allowed to register a child for a program, **providing all of the following conditions are met:**

1. The parent must complete and sign a registration form in front of a Parks and Recreation staff member at one of our community centers during the week preceding the first registration day. The signed form can then be given to the proxy for registration and must be accompanied by the correct registration fee.

2. Proxies may register children from only one family besides their own.
3. A child registered by proxy must have a completed registration form for each class.
4. The proxy must wait in the regular registration lines to register the child. If the class reaches maximum capacity before the proxy can register the child, the child will not be allowed in that particular class. The proxy will not be allowed to register the child in another program/class without the parent's prior written consent for that program/class. Therefore, parents should consider completing more than one consent form.
5. If any of the above guidelines are violated, the registration by proxy will not be allowed.


